THIRTEENTH BIRTHDAY: PURITY

ebster's Dictionary defines "pure" as: "free from everything that might make dirty, change, or lower the quality; free from sin or guilt." Purity is much more than refraining from sex or heeding a list of don'ts. It is a positive, passionate existence that frees us to experience all God made us to enjoy. Sadly, our culture bombards kids with opportunities to tarnish their lives, even making fun of those who try to remain clean. How do we help our children go against the norm and live a life filled with the intense joys only purity can bring?

Step One: Clarify the Standard: Psalm 119:9 says "How can a young person stay on the path of purity? By living according to your word." While Jesus Christ was the only person to live a life of total purity, he invites us to follow his example by fulfilling the purpose for which we were made. When it comes to purity, our children need to understand that their bodies belong to God first and to their future spouse second. I Corinthians 6:18-21 says "Flee from sexual immorality...your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit...you are not your own...Therefore honor God with your body."

Step Two: Focus on Purity, Not Just Sex: It is vital to emphasize remaining a virgin before marriage. But purity is much more than saying no to premarital sex. Sometimes teen culture

tries to define purity as not "going all the way," while anything else is considered fair game. God desires for us to have much more than "technical virginity" before marriage. It is possible to be technically a virgin, and yet have lost your purity. God has a great plan for our hearts, minds and actions. Teach your child that purity involves every area of life, like media, jokes, conversations, thoughts, and fashion.

Step Three: Give a Positive Vision: Give a positive vision of the purpose and joy of sex in the context of marriage. Nothing gives a child a positive view of God's design for passion like basking in the love of parents who cherish one another and speak positively about the joys of marital intimacy. Use discretion, don't be graphic, but celebrate God's design for sex.

Step Four: Delay Temptation: Kids want to start dating younger than ever before. One study showed that a child who starts dating at twelve-years-old has only a 9% chance of remaining a virgin at eighteen years old. If they wait until sixteen, however, they are 80% likely to be a virgin at eighteen. God made us with desires that are very good. But those desires can be awakened too early. So talk to your child about purity before allowing them to date and then continue dialogue after they start the process. The topic can be awkward so try to make

the experience comfortable. For one child that could mean scheduling a regular coffee date; for another it might mean chatting while hunting or attending a sports event. Find some context for keeping the lines of communication open.

Step Five: Pray for Them: Commit yourself as a parent to cover your child in prayer. Pray specifically for his or her purity in relationships, a clean thought life, integrity in school and other activities. Pray for a heart that is connected to Christ and a mind immersed in God's Word. Likewise, pray for their future spouse to be living a life of purity in preparation to join your child in a pure marriage bed someday.

Practical Ideas: Write letters to your child. Share your heart and scripture instead of mere rules. Give them a vision of God's plan for their lives. Plan a time to talk about the letter after they have read it such as a special breakfast or coffee date. Take time to listen to what they say and try to steer clear of teaching or lecturing.

Most teenagers have a mentality centered on the immediate. Help your child think about long term goals for what they want in their dating and marriage relationships. What are their goals for themselves and their future spouse? Ask questions like: "What would your future spouse want from you in purity?" And, "what do you want from your future spouse?"

You might choose to use the enclosed Purity Checklist to help your child set some helpful boundaries and accountability to live with sexual purity.

And as in all areas of our Christ following journey, *elevate the grace and forgiveness of God* so that *when* they fail, they know they can come to God to experience his forgivenss and mercy. Sam Alberry says that it isn't *whether* you have sexual desire, or even what kind, but will you submit that desire to Jesus? So even though God shows us life that leads to flourishing, we all come up short. We want our children to know and truly believe that failure is not final, and that God is rich in mercy.

The natural desires of the sin nature combined with the accessibility of sexually immoral material, a secularization of our society and an atmosphere of sexuality that most of us did not grow up in, all wage a battle on our kids' purity. Pray for them. Pray with them - sure it will weird them out! Pray for your own purity and model it in your own choices.

DIGITAL RESOURCES: As with any app, there are mixed reviews, but no Christian parent should leave any device that has data or wi-fi unprotected. If you don't like Covenant Eyes, use something and deal with the heart, because over 90% of kids have encountered some sort of explicit web content by middle school. They will hear how to avoid "blocks" and may encounter inappropriate content on someone else's device, so we still have to do the heart-work. Check online review charts for comparisons of content blockers and reporting programs. Don't put this off! Porn addiction is real and dangerous - for you and your child.

- Covenant Eyes/NetNanny/ForceField While there are many other parental control apps and software, several Eastview families use Covenant Eyes and Net Nanny programs for accountability and protection.
- PluggedIn Online When your child asks to download some music, watch a program, play a new game, or go to the movies with his friends you can get quick access to Christian content reviews.
- RightNow Media This is a great FREE video resource for you and your child on issues of sex and pornography.

A COVENANT OF PURITY

PURITY CHECKLIST

It is wise to help an early teen establish clear boundaries BEFORE they face tempting or awkward situations. As soon as he or she begins taking an interest in the opposite sex spend time together walking through the following discussion checklist to create healthy expectations and goals. This checklist was created by the staff of HomePointe Ministry/Inkling Productions. Use this Checklist as a start, but then create a Purity Checklist of your own. The point is, create clear expectations and present them in such a way that your child knows that you and God are for them, not against them.

DATING:

Dating, utlimately, is spending time with someone of the opposite sex in order to discover a future spouse. It is about building a friendship without the physical bonds that God reserved for marriage. Dating is a process for those who are approaching the age where they might want to get married. It allows a couple the opprotunity to get to know each other and enjoy building a relationship. When your teen is ready to start dating, they probably aren't thinking about picking a spouse quite yet, but it is wise to follow the old wisdom of only dating people you would ever consider marrying. You never know whom you might fall "in love" with.

It is also best for you to make sure you are clear about how old your child must be in order to date. Set that age and communicate it early. For young teens, we recommend group acitivities over pairing off as boyfriends and girlfriends.

MODESTY: The issue of modesty is more than just defining how short is too short, how low is too low, or how tight is too tight? Modesty has a lot more to do with our hearts than our wardrobes.

The Bible instructs that clothing should be modest. Our faith should influence our wardrobe choices as much as it influences the rest of our behavior. Being respectable and having self-control should be the standard for every area of our lives, including the way we dress.

These three questions help us examine what to wear or not wear:

- 1. Is it tasteful or improper?
- 2. Is it moderate or extreme?
- 3. Does it reflect my witness as a Christian?

As Christians, we are called to modesty not as a list of rules that limit our freedom, but rather an irresistible virtue that reflects our faith.

ACCOUNTABILITY: In addition to parents, encourage your child to identify a close friend or two who shares similar values to help hold each other accountable to living with sexual purity.

DRAWING THE LINE: Coach your teen to decide now what he/ she will and will not do in a relationship with the opposite sex. Discuss the following summary of the natural progression of physical intimacy. Decide together where to draw the line in order to protect purity and prevent a broken heart.

 Flirting Side hugs

- Kissing

Touching/

- Frontal hugs French kissing
- Holding hands
- caressing with Arms around clothes on each other

Cuddling

- Petting/groping under or without clothes
- Oral sex
- Sexual intercourse

DANGER ZONES: Create a list of strategies that will help them avoid potentially compromising situations including...

- Never be in a house with the opposite sex without parents home.
- Stay in family areas of the house. No going in bedrooms.
- Doors of the room you are in remain open.
- Come straight home after a date. No "parking."

- Limit alone time. Make sure your child maintains his/her other friendships and activities.
- Date growing Christians.
- Group dates as friends provide much of the positive aspects of dating, yet limit much of the risk of harm. Delay 1:1 dating until a designated age such as 16 or 17 years old.

EXIT PLAN: Create an easy way for your teen to flee a tempting or risky situation with the opposite sex. Discuss possible "code language" they might use when calling or texting such as "Checking in." This will alert you that they need to leave. Then you can tell them you need them to come home which gives them excuse for their friends/date without embarrassing them or risking harm.

GRACE: If your teen has already made mistakes such as viewing pornography or going too far with a boyfriend/girlfriend, respond with grace and forgiveness. Assure them of your unconditional love. Delay the conversation if you're emotional. If you already blew it and freaked out on them, go back and ask for forgiveness. Let them know you're ready to talk now and just reacted in the moment. Read John 8 and ask God to help you model Jesus' balance with the woman caught in adultery. You call the sin a sin, but offer hope by challenging him/her to start fresh and "go and sin no more." Be a safe, committed and loving adult that journeys with them through this season.



SAFEGUARDING YOUR HOME

PROTECTING YOUR CHILD FROM ONLINE THREATS

Did you realize that your child is far past the average age window that children are first exposed to pornographic content on the internet? If you haven't already, you need to make sure that every device in your family is protected. Having unprotected devices in your home would be as if our parents had left explicit magazines lying around the house, expecting us to make good choices.

3 STEPS TO PROTECTING YOUR CHILD ONLINE

- 1. Talk to your child about using their devices. Discuss how they should never give out personal information or chat with strangers. Have an age-appropriate conversation about pornography. Stress how important it is to let you know if they come across inappropriate content. Make sure they know you are a safe person to talk to about what they've seen. For help in talking with kids about pornography, check out Good Pictures/Bad Pictures and Good Pictures/Bad Pictures Jr. by Kristen Jenson, M.A. and Gail Poyner, PhD. There are also great resources at family.org and covenanteyes.com.
- Set boundaries for internet usage. Require that all internet usage be done in a central area of the house where parents and other family members will be. Do not allow surfing while you are not home, including homework which typically requires a lot of need for google images.

Do not allow devices in a child's room - they should not need privacy to be on the internet.

3. Protect your devices with a content blocker and report generator. There are several companies that provide these services/software. Focus on the Family partners with Net Nanny and Forcefield. Covenant Eyes is used by many families at Eastview. These programs will not only block content, but will also send accountability reports on everyone's usage in the family. You should also go into the settings of each device and determine the restrictions for that device, which is then protected by a 4 digit PIN.

Commit yourself to being intentional about being a gatekeeper for your child's heart and mind - no apologies. It will be impossible to protect them entirely, but these simple steps are a good start toward giving them a good shot at never knowing the dark world of a porn addiction.



THIS YEAR'S MARRIAGE PLAN

ach year we want to encourage you to make a plan to keep your marriage healthy. One of the most important gifts you'll give to your child is the love you give to your spouse. When mom and dad love each other and demonstrate the traits of a healthy (NOT PERFECT!) marriage, it not only sets a good example of a godly marriage, but gives them a greater sense of security and well-being. Andy Stanley in The Principle of the Path writes "We don't drift to good places." (Thomas Nelson, 2008). Good marriages require intentionality. Use the plan below to make an intentional effort in your marriage this year. Read The Best Us by Ted Lowe (©MarriedPeople 2016) for a full explanation of Have Serious Fun! Love God First; Respect and Love; Practice Your Promise.

Have Serious Fun! Date Night Scheduling: Grab your calendars and mark at least TWO date nights for each month and PROTECT those dates. Remember that you were boyfriend and girlfriend before you were dad and mom, and have fun together! No family administration discussions! For extra fun, watch for sponsored "Date Nights" by Eastview's Marriage Ministry.

Love God First - Faith Practices 101: Research finds that couples who pray together at least twice a week have a divorce rate of less than 1% (HomePointe). Commit to praying as a couple at least twice a week. Plan which worship service the two of you will attend together each week – try to avoid "dividing and conquering" in order to volunteer.

Love and Respect - Write an Annual Letter: Write a letter to your spouse for your anniversary this year, much like the one in this packet that you will write to your child. Write a letter of memories from this past year, affirmations, prayers and promises to each other.

Practice Your Promise - Personal Growth: Evaluate how you might grow as a spouse, such as "listening better," "praising her in public," or "initiating romance." Write it down and seal it in an envelope. When you receive next year's packet, open the envelope and assess your progress.

Invest in Your Marriage: Join an email blog like lesandleslie.com, choose one book to read this year, or choose a small group study on marriage. The Eastview Marriage Ministry and RightNow Media have many helpful events and resources.

- 3. Text #parentplan to 309.808.6002 to register your family to receive the booklets each year on your children's birthdays. If you are a regular attender, the registration will be quick as we will match your family records with your phone number no data entry required.

FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER: You will obviously have specific needs along the way that we do not cover in these booklets. You might have a child with special needs, or your child might be dealing with a specific issue, or you might need more creative ideas for family times together... whatever it is, we will do our best to offer helpful resources. Stop by our Family Resource Center on the lower level of the atrium on the Normal Campus. We have a rotating inventory of resources that give you some quick advice on a variety of topics with recommended resources and next steps to take at Eastview. We highlight various books and resources to help with different aspects and seasons of parenting and marriage.

MEMBER CARE: There might be certain seasons where you have specific needs and just need a little extra help. We understand and have been there too. Because of this, we have different areas where we can assist our members needs:

- **CARE APPOINTMENTS:** We know that connecting to others for prayer and encouragement is a necessary part of our spiritual formation, especially in times of need. Care Appointments are scheduled times we have set aside to meet with you for pastoral care. We would like to hear your story, pray with you, and offer guidance on your next steps. 
